It is clean-out time in the basement, and to my surprise and delight, up popped Operation Success': A Picture Story of the US.S Roan (DD-853~ On Her European cruise 1952.) The book, mostly a collection of photographs taken by various crewmembers during the Mediterranean cruise (August 1952 - February 1953), also includes little jewels such as Joe Carlson's "Ramblin' Roan" (enclosed). Since you seem eager to establish names and dates, I also enclose copies of the roster pages. These are the men and the times that contributed so much to the history (and in some cases the myth) of the Roan.

The Cruise Book brings up a question. They haven't made any more Roan sailors since 1973 (unless you expand the definition to include sailors who served on the MFevzi Qakmak (D-351). which is what the Roan was renamed after transfer to Turkey). Those who sailed the Roan are aging every issue of "The Jolly Cholly" chronicles the passing of a few more - and eventually, the line will die out. The question is - what to do with the memorabilia that has been gathering dust in attics and basements for the last 30-50 years? There is a temptation to ship off things like the Cruise Book to the Roan Association (i.e., Richard Souza) who I am sure would take good care of it. But as one recent letter in "Mail Bag" points out, the Association itself has limited life expectancy. Sooner or later there simply won't be any Roan sailors left to treasure the mementos and stories. What should be done with them? Surely the few things I have, and what must be a substantial collection among the collective remaining crew have value. Is there any way we could establish a separate C. H. Roan collection in a permanent archives, perhaps, The National Association of Destroyer Veterans (Tin Can Sailors) or the Naval Institute? Any suggestions?






