
The answer, I never grew up. After high school all I wanted was a car and a job. I must admit though the deck force was not my calling, I should have tried for the engine room.

In Trieste Harbor - 12 May, 1948 Army, Navy Meet: In 'Chow Business'

It was a joint Army-Navy operation last night when 25 men from the 2nd Battalion, Cannon and Tank Companies, were invited aboard the USS Roan and 25 Navy men were taken to various units in the 2nd Battalion for the evening meal, and an evening's entertainment. The Trieste soldiers were treated to Navy chow aboard the destroyer and then shown how the sailors live on board ship. The Navy men were given a view of the landlubber's life with a complete tour of the 2nd Battalion quarters, chapel and battalion day room. The sailors were very much impressed when they saw the modernistic chapel and day room. The destroyer Roan arrived in Trieste Saturday morning. She is skippered Cmdr. William N. Deragon, of Newport, R.I. The ship, popularly known as the "Roaming Roan" is named after Pfc. Charles H. Roan, U.S. Marine Corps, who was killed in action in the Palau Islands in the South Pacific. Private Roan was posthumously awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor.



ANOTHER ROAN HERO

The Secretary of the Navy takes pleasure in presenting the NAVY COMMENDATION MEDAL to



JIMMIE ROGERS NORMAN, MM1- P1 United States Navy



for service as set forth in the following:

CITATION:

"For outstanding performance of duty while serving as Petty Officer in Charge, in the forward engine room of the USS CHARLES H. ROAN (DD 853) at 0930 on 16 May 1963. NORMAN exhibited outstanding qualities beyond that required and expected of his rate or experience. During ASW operations with the Task Group 83.4 on the morning of 16 May 1963, the starboard tail shaft broke off, and the propeller was lost. With the loss of the starboard propeller, 25,000 horsepower was unleashed in the starboard engine; and had this power gone unchecked for as short a time as five seconds, the engine would have carried away, resulting in its total destruction and the probable loss of life of men in the engine room. With only vague indications of the exact nature of the casualty, NORMEN acted promptly and effectively, with deliberate precision, and complete comprehension of the gravity of the situation and it's possible consequences; he took immediate and effective steps to secure the engine and to investigate all possibilities of damage. As a result of his instantaneous reaction and timely action; there was no damage to the starboard main engine, and there were no personnel casualties. His quick thinking, leadership, skillful application of professional skill and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the UNITED STATES NAVAL SERVICE."

Hero Sailor Honored Here

A sailor whose quick action is credited by his commanding officer with saving five lives and an estimated \$500,000 for the Navy last May was honored as Sailor of the Month by the Newport Rotary Club and the Chamber of Commerce naval affairs committee yesterday at the Hotel Viking.

Machinist's Mate 1/C. Jimmie R. Norman of destroyer Roan heard himself praised by several speakers. He is credited with making a five-second decision that saved the ship's engine room from being badly damaged and five shipmates from possible death.

Norman's feat was described and praised by Capt. Jackson H. Rayner, DesRon 10 commander, and Cmdr. Charles H. Hayden, the Roan's skipper. Capt. S. E. Terrill of the Destroyer Force staff extended the congratulations of Rear Adm. Robert H. Speck, commander.

William H. Wood Jr., Rotary president, gave Norman a fishing reel from the club. Morton Socks, Sailor of the Month chairman for the Naval Affairs Committee, presented him with a leather bound book containing letters of congratulations from various officials.



He presented Norman with a certificate of honorary citizenship from Newport and Middletown officials.

On the 21st of September the USS CHARLES II. ROAN will be decommissioned from active Naval Service, due to military budgeting and the Navy's program of modernization throughout the fleet.

During the twenty-seven years since commissioning ROAN has served her country well on every ocean of the world and has shown the flag all over the face of the earth. An indication of her durability and dependability even into her twenty-seventh year of service was the around the world cruise which we completed in seven Months last October 1972. 
Enclosed is the information of Ex-TCG M.F.9AKMAK II (D-351) (Ex-USS CHARLES H. ROAN) which I have tried several times by e-mail. Naval vessels of Turkey use a prefix before ship names. Therefore TCG means Turkish Republic Ship (Turkiye Cumhuriyeti Gemisi).

Ex. USS CHARLES H. ROAN actually became the second M.F. CAKMAK in Turkish Navy. The first M.F CAKMAK was originally a British Milne Class Destroyer. That ship was commissioned in 1959 and was decommissioned in 1971.

Meantime I wish you and your family a Merry Christmas and a happy, prosperous New Year.

Republic of Turkey Ship - TCG Maresal Fevzi Cakmak D - 351 (Formerly U.S.S. Charles H. Roan DD - 853)

(The USS Charles H. Roan was transferred and sold to the Turkish Navy for \$225,000. Her crypto gear was sold for \$25,000 making the sale of the "Roan" for \$250,000. We were certainly worth more than that!)

INFORMATION ABOUT EX. M. F. CAKMAK (D-351) (FORMER USS CHARLES H. ROAN DD-853)

The former USS Charles H. Roan was transferred to Turkish Navy on September 21, 1973 in Newport, Rhode Island. She then was commissioned to Turkish fleet on November 6, 1973 in Golcuk Turkey and began to serve with the Turkish flag on 14 November 1973.

M.F. Cakmak was assigned to be one of the ships of Second Destroyer Division of the Surface Action Group. Later on the Turkish Navy assigned her to the Third Destroyer Division.

Some of the important missions conducted by ex. USS Charles H. Roan is as follows:

- -- M.F. Cakmak was deployed in the eastern Mediterranean during The Cyprus peace operations on July 19, 1974. During this operation she first sunk an enemy fast attack craft by gunfire. She was also subject to friendly fire from the Turkish Air Force, but received only slight damage. She continued patrolling in the eastern Mediterranean until August 20, 1974.
- -- M.F. Cakmak performed a formal port visit to Durres Albania between 24-27 August 1992.
- -- She fired a Harpoon missile during a missile exercise on 9 July 1987. The target ship was the ex. USS McKean (DD-784). M.F. Cakmak was the first ship in the Turkish Navy to fire a Harpoon SSM. The Harpoon system was installed onboard in Turkey in 1986

M.F. Cakmak was decommissioned on 28 January 1994. On 21 October 1994 she became a target ship under The Golcuk Port Security Command. On April 7, 1995 M.F. Cakmak was transferred to a governmental organization and was scrapped.

Dear Joe:

PLANS FOR THE 2002 REUNION

The 2002 USS Charles H. Roan DD 853 Reunion will be held in Norfolk, VA from 4 to 7 April 2002. The Reunion will be held at the Norfolk Waterside Marriott Hotel on East Main Street. Yes, East Main Street. You old timers will not recognize the area. If you have not seen Norfolk since before 1962, you will be pleasantly pleased. The only building left from the old days is the Shelton Arcade. We used to walk through the Arcade from East Main Street to Phume and Granby Streets to catch the city bus back to fleet landing.

Hotel information: The Norfolk Waterside Marriott is centrally located and within walking distance of all our activities except the tour to the Naval Base. Rooms will cost \$99.00 + tax, per single/double (per day) with breakfast included. Tax is 11.5%. The Marriott Hotel is connected by covered walkway to the Waterside Festival Marketplace, a dining and entertainment complex featuring specially shops. The hotel is also within walking distance of Nauticus Maritime Center with the USS Wisconsin and the Navy Museum, Mac Arthur Center, that features 120 stores including Nordstroms and Dillards, Mac Arthur Memorial, and historic St. Paul's Church. The hotel has an indoor swimming pool with three hot tubs and a fitness center on the 6th Floor.

The tentative schedule for the Reunion is as follows:

Thursday 4 April: Early bird tours on Thursday afternoon to either Williamsburg or the Naval Marine Science Museum in Virginia Beach. Harbor Dinner Cruise on the Spirit of Norfolk on Thursday evening.

Friday 5 April: Golf Tournament in the morning. Self guided tour of Nauticus and USS Wisconsin in the afternoon. Welcome Aboard Reception on Friday evening.

Saturday 6 April: Association meeting in the morning. Tour of the Naval Base with lunch on base in the afternoon. Banquet on Saturday evening.

Sunday 7 April: Depart.

The cost of the reunion will be \$75.00 per person (the same that we paid at St. Augustine, FL two years ago). The \$75.00 covers the Hospitality Room, Welcome Aboard Reception, and the Banquet.

Parking: There is a fee for parking. The hotel has two city parking garages next to the hotel. One is attached to the building and the other has a covered walkway from the 3rd floor of the parking garage to the hotel. Parking can be paid three ways. Two: You can have parking charged to your room, \$10.00 per day. You will be issued a parking pass and go in and out of the parking garage as much as you want. Three: Valet parking by the hotel staff, cost is \$15.00 a day. The best deal is to have the parking charged to your room. RV Parking is not available in the parking garages. RV parking is available at Harbor Park about 5 blocks from the hotel. We are looking for another parking area for RV's.

If you fly into Norfolk, we recommend that you do not rent a car because of the parking fees. You will not need a car for travel to our activities. Groome Limo's operates from the airport. Transportation to the hotel is \$20.00 for two people (\$37.00 round trip if you purchase round trip when you arrive).

From the Memoirs of Captain Richard B. Derickson, USN C.O. - USS C. H. Roan DD 853 (9/46 to 6/49)

The USS Charles H. Roan, Flagship of Destroyer Squadron Ten, was the last to cast off from her mooring buoy and stand out of Newport harbor. By the time she cleared Brenton Point and Beaver Tail, the other ships of the squadron were well ahead and formed in column, natural order.

On the fo'c'sl of the Roan the anchor was secured for sea and the anchor detail left its station. On the bridge the commodore directed the captain to make 25 knots in order to get on station at the head of the column as soon as possible.

In short order the ship was up to speed with "a bone in her teeth" and a broad white wake trailing off astern. The sea was calm and it was a beautiful day to be doing 25 knots.

Suddenly on the deserted fo'c's there arose a frightful clatter and red, rusty dust was seen to rise from the chain pipe as the port anchor chain ran out at an alarming rate. "All engines back emergency full" the captain ordered and the engine room telegraph went from full ahead to back full. "Anchor detail man you station on the double."

The ship trembled, shook herself with some violence and within two minutes or less she was dead in the water and her popped boiler safety valves threw a large cloud of white steam into the air. On her acceptance trials a year before, this same test had been put to the ship, but then it had been a planned event and not a surprise out of the blue.

Fortunately the bottom was hard, smooth sand and at the speed the ship was going when the anchor hit it must have skipped and bounced along giving it no opportunity to bight until we were nearly stopped. That is my surmise.

We hove up and housed the anchor and this time the anchor detail paid close attention to the details of securing. There was no damage, no loss or failure of material of any kind, but I would like to report that all but the inboard 10 fathoms of the port chain gave the appearance of having been newly chrome plated.
